MATH TEAM WINNERS

The math team finished up yet another extremely successful regular season in March. After all 5 regular season meets were completed, CHRHS placed 3rd among large schools in the Central Maine Math League and 4th overall in CMML. When compared to all 85 schools competing throughout the state, CHRHS placed 20th overall, and 6th in class B.

Individuals winning awards for their performance in the regular season were: Charlie Ash, who was the fifth highest scoring junior in Central Maine, Joey Michalakes, who was the top scorer among all Sophomores in CMML, and Kyle Murdock, who was the second highest scoring freshman in the league.

WATER:

- 1. We all know that water is important, but I've never seen it written down like this before.
- 2. 85% of Americans are chronically dehydrated. (Likely applies to half the World).
- 3. In 37% of Americans, the thirst mechanism is so weak that it is often mistaken for hunger. Even mild Dehydration will slow down one's metabolism as much as 3%.
- 4. One glass of water shuts down the midnight hunger pangs for almost 100% of the dieters studied in a U. Washington study.

COKE

Change in Administrative Software: Impact on Course Registration

We have begun the process of switching our administrative software (with which, in essence,

the entire school is run) from MacSchool to Powerschool. While this is certain to have many implications, there is an immediate one of which we need to advise you.

Students are in the process of choosing their courses for the 2004-2005 school year. In the past, they have been able to do so keeping in mind that--should they change their mind during the summer months--it would be relatively easy to make changes before school actually began. Not so this year.

The School Counseling Department staff will be returning on August 19, 2004. Our first order of business will be to learn how to use this system. However, as with any new software application, it takes time and practice to develop the level of skill necessary for proficient use. The expectation that we will do so in two days, and then embark on three days of scheduling changes (as we have in the past), is unrealistic at best.

As such, we are advising students to choose their courses bearing in mind that they may not have an opportunity to change courses until school has actually begun; they need to plan to sit in the classes in September that they sign up for now in March. Please help us emphasize the importance of thoughtful course selection.

Cell Phones In School or Not

During a critical incident, are cell phones a blessing or a nightmare? Increasingly, parents and students are asking school officials around the country to allow students to have cell phones in school, based on safety reasons. Unfortunately, convenience is typically the real reason driving this request. Yet there are a number of reasons suggesting that cells not only disrupt the educational environment, but also detract from school safety in a crisis situation.

Perhaps this is why 81 percent of the officers in the NASRO survey indicated that their schools do not allow students to use cell phones, and 78 percent of the officers did not feel that student use of a cell phone improved school security.

Under this guise of improved school safety, some parents are urging school boards and administrators to let their children carry cell phones, even if the phones can be distracting in class. But rather then help, cell phones can actually detract from school safety in a number of ways.

- Cell phones can be used to call in bomb threats or even to detonate a bomb
- Cell phone use by students can hamper rumor control and disrupt and delay effective response by public safety personnel
- Students using cell phones can impede public safety measures by summoning parents to the scene of an emergency when officials might be trying to evacuate students to another site to meet their parents
- Cell phone systems typically overload during a major crisis, as they did during the Columbine and World Trade Center attacks. Used by a large number of students at once you could knock cell phone systems and hamper communication among school administrators and crisis team members

In addition, an Associated Press story dated November 14, 2003, is titled, "FBI: Rigged cell phone might trigger bombs." The story stated that cell phones, modified so they could destroy bombs, were found by investigators probing the recent Saudi Arabia bombings, raising concern that such methods could be used in the United States by terrorists. The FBI warned law enforcement agencies to be alert to potential use of such devices and incorporate awareness into their counter terrorism preventative measures. Terrorists have used pagers and radio systems to detonate bombs by remote control, the FBI said.

A cell phone was used in the July 2002 bombing at a cafeteria at Hebrew University in Jerusalem that killed seven people,

including five Americans. The bomb, filled with nails and metal, was hidden in a bag left on a table in the crowded room and was detonated by call from another cell phone.

Even though experts agree you have to have a lot of technological ability and electronic training to rig a cell phone to detonate a bomb, are we will to take this chance in our school? At the very least, cell phones could prove to be a major disruption in a school during a crisis situation.

At Camden Hills Regional High School, we currently allow our students to carry cell phones while in school. Our policy reads as follows:

Cell Phones and Pagers

Due to interruptions to classes and to the instructional process, students who bring cell phones and/or pagers to school are asked to turn them off and not use them during the school day. Failure to comply will result in the communication device being seized. It may be picked up after school is dismissed. The second incident will result in the parent/guardian being called to pick up the device. Parents who need to contact their student during the school day may do so through the school office.

If your student or you have been affected by this rule or are affected in the future, please remember education and safety go hand in hand. You must have an educational environment that is conducive to learning in order to learn.

Matchmaker: The Zenith Community Connections Program

Blind dates. Everyone has had at least one. A friend says, "Oh wait until you meet so and so, you'll be a perfect match!" And you think to yourself, hmmm, maybe, maybe not.

This is, no doubt, what the Zenith students were thinking, when the "Community Connections" program was first explained to them last year. The idea arose out of a widely felt need to pair alternative high school students with adult mentors in the community. The goal was to offer students out-of-school experiences with a trusted adult that would build on the way they tended to learn best, hands on.

In January of 2003, the program found MBNA funding and initially launched in the final quarter of the semester, with only enough time to introduce 12 out of 24 students to new mentors-but with only two months to meet before school ended. Studies show that to be effective, a mentor and a student must

meet at least four hours a month and be involved for more than a year.

For that reason, the Community Connections program began practically all over again the next school year, as it built up a bank of reliable mentors. The initial goal of this program was simply to find a good match between Zenith students and mentors and see how well they connected. Over the long haul, the idea was for students and mentors to spend more time together and foster a trusting relationship so that students could investigate different career paths and hobbies.

Ideally, (like a blind date), two people meet, hit it off and foster an instant trusting relationship. In reality, however, particularly with many students who were having difficulty staying in the mainstream of education, this year has been a delicate dance in pairing the right people together. In the second year of Community Connections, the program has been like a roller coaster chugging up the track, on the verge of rounding the corner.

At first, 13 out of 23 Zenith students made initial contact with a variety of community mentors in social work, massage therapy, restaurants, music and art. And while this was a promising start, an adjustment period followed, in which the majority of the students re-evaluated their interests. Take Cory LaForge, 18, a Zenith junior who initially had an interest in oil painting, but kept finding that time was an obstacle in meeting with his mentor. Now, refocused on what he likes best-music and the expression of it-he'll be meeting with Nathaniel Bernier, owner of Wild Rufus, on a regular basis to study the roots of music and write music reviews for the store.


